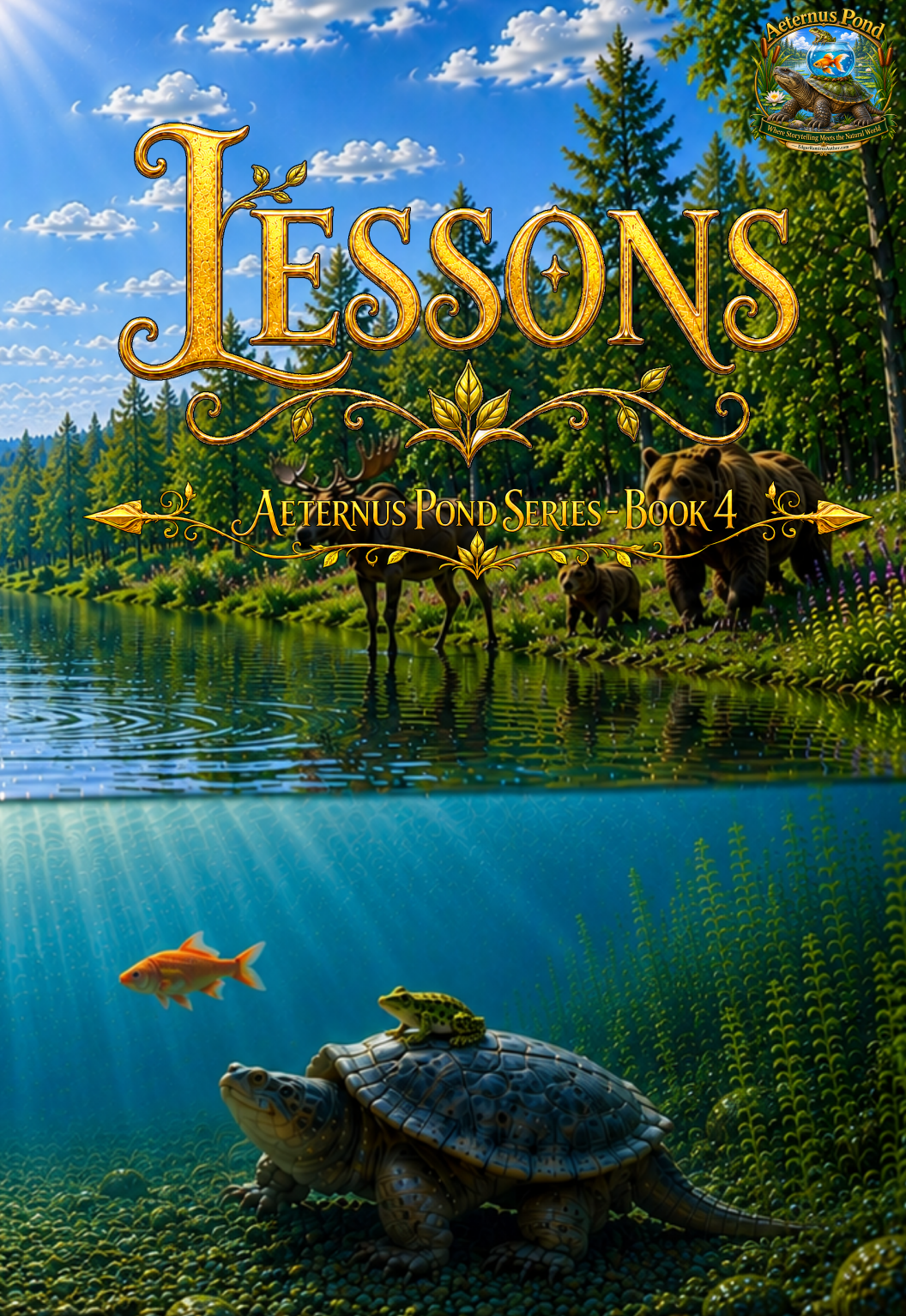




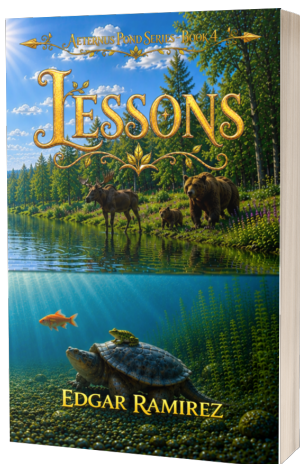

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Who was your favorite character in *Lessons*, and what about them did you connect with?
2. Choose a character and describe what lesson they learned during the story. How did that lesson help them grow?
3. What was the most important lesson Gary, Sheldon, and Meadow learned from their experiences? Why do you think it was important?
4. What do you think was the greatest challenge the characters faced, and how would you have handled the situation differently?
5. Throughout the story, the characters learn by observing the world around them. What lessons can nature teach us about patience, perseverance, or working together?
6. Describe an important lesson you have learned from a family member, teacher, friend, or personal experience. How has it helped you in your own life?

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

LESSONS FROM NATURE - Throughout *Lessons*, Gary, Sheldon, and Meadow discover that the natural world can be one of our greatest teachers. Have students take a nature walk around their school, neighborhood, or a local park. Ask them to observe plants, animals, insects, or weather patterns and record at least five observations in a nature journal. Students should then write a paragraph explaining one important lesson they learned from nature and how it relates to the story.

WORDS OF WISDOM - Every person learns valuable lessons through experience. Ask students to interview a parent, grandparent, teacher, or another trusted adult about an important life lesson they have learned. Students should write a one-page summary describing the lesson, how it was learned, and why it is still meaningful today. Invite volunteers to share their interviews with the class and discuss how wisdom can be passed from one generation to the next.
